

"The opposite of addiction is not sobriety, it is human connection!" Johann Hari, British Journalist.

In the year 2000, Robert Putnam, then a Harvard University political scientist, wrote his now iconic text, "Bowling Alone: The Collapse and Revival of American Community." In his book, Dr. Putnam pointed out that we humans are social animals and thus function best when we are part of social structures greater than ourselves, such as family and social and service organizations. Sadly, Dr. Putnam further notes in his book that we Americans have become, perhaps more than any time in our lifetime, a nation of "loners," who rather than connecting with, have become more socially isolated from, each other.

When I first read Dr. Putnam's book many years ago, I thought back to my childhood growing up in Rhode Island. At the conclusion of WW2, my parents moved back east from California, where I was born, because my Dad had been stationed there during the war building jet engines. My Father and Mother lived with his parents, in Rhode Island, for several years, until they were able to save enough money to purchase their own home.

Before long, my family knew most of the people who lived on our block, and my siblings and I had scores of friends in the neighborhood. My parents had no fear, therefore, when my siblings and I would leave the house to play or would together go "trick or treating" on Halloween. For Jewish holidays, birthdays, etc., my paternal grandparents, aunts and uncles, and cousins would frequently all get together, since we all lived within 15 or 20 minutes of each other. How different things are today.

This past week, I had the opportunity to go back in time and again experience the power of a warm and caring neighborhood community. I was invited to give the Sunday morning sermon. The topic was "How do we express our free will in ways that will be pleasing to God?" and to teach on Monday morning (I spoke on Antisemitism) and Tuesday morning (I spoke on Gaza) to members of the Ocean Park Association in Ocean Park Maine. Part of the nation-wide Chautauqua Christian community, The Ocean Park Association was founded in 1881. The Association currently consists of approximately 700 family members, some of whom live there year-round, while others, who are still working, come for summer vacation, holidays, and other occasions.

While the community is located just a block or two from a beautiful Maine beach, there are no "high rise" buildings, and the only commercial establishments are a handful of "mom and pop" stores. What most reminded me of my childhood, however, is that as my hosts and I would be walking together down the streets of the community, they would stop several times on each block to greet and say hello and introduce me to people they knew. When I asked them how they knew so many people in the community, they responded that their families, along with the families of many of the families in the Association, had been coming there for a number of generations.

If someone in the community is sick, or there is a death in the family, members of the community will bring food, run errands for, etc., the affected family. If a family in the Association celebrates a "simcha," a joyful event, others in the community will often join and participate in the celebration. In keeping with the principles or guidelines the Chautauqua community, the members pray together, learn together, and experience together cultural and social/recreational events.

As I was driving home from my wonderful experience at Ocean Park, Maine, I thought about the emphasis Judaism has always placed on "community," with how the well-being of the community typically taking precedence over the wants and needs of the individual. Apparently, The Almighty and our ancestors recognized long ago our need, as humans, as Jews, to be part of a warm, safe, and caring community.

Historically, Jewish People were able to derive the benefits of being part of such a community without even having to try, for many of our ancestors lived in "shtetls" in the old country and lived in predominantly Jewish neighborhoods in this country. No longer is this case, however, with most Jews in the Merrimack Valley living in predominantly non-Jewish neighborhoods and communities.

The assimilation of the Jewish community in our country makes the role of the synagogue even more vital, not only to the survival of Judaism, but to the social and psychological well-being of the Jewish community. It is not by chance that the word for "synagogue," in Hebrew is *beit knesset*, "a house of gathering"! Of the many reasons that all of us can and should feel proud of being part of this holy community, none is thus more important than our being like "family" and a warm, kind, and caring community to each other.

Being part of this caring community, for example, has helped to greatly reduce my anxiety level relating to my July 24th back surgery. *Todah Rabbah*, "Thank you very much" for this!

Most important was being alone with our inner circle away from other life's distractions, focusing on what we had at the moment. Such a luxury.

Why do I tell these stories? because I know we all can relate. I am sure we can all conjure up summertime memories that bring a smile to our faces. Sometimes our memories are so deep down and then suddenly they come rising to the surface like it was yesterday.

Summer is also a time for Simchas, when we can have an outpouring of love and togetherness. A time our aloneness feels less defined. Mayim is integral to these joys of life, from the breaking of the waters and the birth of a child and the breaking of a glass and we shout Mazel Tov.

At CBI, our community comes together in celebrating Simchas and each other's moments of joy. At CBI each Shabbat we read in the Personal Meditation in our siddur "help us find the contentment in one another...may selfish pride not divide us may pride in one another unite us..." I think this is our value at CBI.
