# Lach L'cha!

#### By Rabbi Howard Mandell



We are just starting a new month in the Hebrew calendar, *mar heshvan*, or "bitter heshvan." The month derives its name from the fact that there are no Jewish holidays in the month. As I mentioned to a Shabbat morning minyan recently, however, with so much of life being about perspective, if you were to ask a group of rabbis what they would call this new month, most would say, "Samach heshvan, "joyous heshvan." Why? Because there are no Jewish holidays in the month.

On a more serious note, we are entering the year 5785 and the month of mar heshvan with the State of Israel being faced with a number of military and humanitarian challenges and with our own nation badly divided in a number of important ways. It was primarily for these reasons that I chose *hakrat hatov*, or "gratitude" to be the main topic of my day 1 *Rosh Hashanah D'var Torah* and *Tikvah*, or "hope" to be the focus of my sermon on *Yom Kippur* day.

Yes, I, each of us, despite all the challenges in our personal lives and in our respective communities, have so much for which to be grateful. I thus asked Janet to please compile for me a list of all those who helped make the High Holy Day services flow so beautifully and to provide so much meaning and joy. My original intention was to address and thank each person by name in my column today. When I started counting the names on the list that Janet provided me, I realized, however, that if I included each separate name, my column would be even longer than the longest genealogies in the Torah.

So, what I have decided to do instead, is to thank each and every one of you by making a donation to the synagogue in your collective honor, If you found the High Holy Days at the synagogue to be joyful and rewarding, if you have gratitude for the many blessings in your lives, I would respectfully ask you, too, to consider making a contribution to the synagogue, to the Rabbi's Discretionary Fund, or to the charity of your choice, for giving tzedakah, in the Jewish Tradition, is one of the most important ways that we show gratitude to God, to our community, and to family and friends.

Another important lesson that our Tradition teaches us is to always try to end a teaching, a sermon, a section, or a book of the Bible on a positive note. As we are all too aware, over 300 Israelis, mainly young people, were killed, raped, and/or kidnapped by Hamas terrorists, while attending the Nova Music Festival, near Kibbutz Re'im, on October 7, 2023. #### Experiencing and Fulfilling a Meaningful Religious Life, Part I – First Day of Rosh Hashanah By: J.J. Golner

I have been asked to speak to you this morning on the topic "Experiencing and fulfilling a meaningful religious life." I agreed to give it a try:

I hope to accomplish this task in a brief but somewhat convoluted way so please indulge me for the next several minutes.

What follows has **not** been sanctioned by any rabbinical authority to my knowledge but I intend to offer an approach not just fashioned by a reluctant two years of Hebrew School lessons in my home town of Roxbury, but from a lifetime of living and learning, as well.

By the way, the word "sanction" that I just used is quite peculiar in itself. It has two meanings, one very opposite to the other. Sanction can mean "go ahead, that's great" or "that's a big no-no, it's not allowed." The context in how its versatility can be used will play out in the conclusion of my remarks. So, hold on to your seat!

When we are born, besides being the object of this wondrous miracle, we are gifted with two, life-time elements, for the lack of a better term. These are a shadow, yes, a SHADOW and more importantly a soul, S-O-U-L!

A shadow will follow you everywhere through the day and importantly, it helps to validate our very existence. It asks for nothing except a bit of light to sustain. Come nighttime it hides as we sleep and reactivates with the dawn of a new day. It requires no sweat on our part to perform its duty.

How you ask? Why not try attending a Shabbos morning minyan at CBI? Here, over a few hours, you will find camaraderie, interesting personal stories, an after-Torah sermon and you can pray or simply meditate in any language or manner that you are comfortable with. You can even **stutter and stumble, mutter or mumble** and Hashem will <u>still</u> hear you. No ritual pre-knowledge is required. We'll even help you find the proper page in the Prayer Book, the siddur, if so desired. And how about the after-service kiddush, a meal in itself, or as Elaine Winic would exclaim, Yummie!

So there you have it, - you'll leave the shul, with a re-energized soul to take you through the week and perhaps further, as we all hope. What could be better - and best of all our own Rabbi Mandell **sanctions** it. **Oh**, there's that word again. However, politics and cellphones of course are also, thankfully, **sanctioned too!** Sorry about that!

Try it, you'll like it and maybe even make it a habit! L'Shanah Tova!

#### Experiencing and Fulfilling a Meaningful Religious Life Part II – Yom Kippur Morning Service By: J.J. Golner

Thank you, Rabbi, for allotting me a few minutes on this very busy day of prayer to expand on my remarks offered during the first day of Rosh Hashanah.

I want to start by apologizing for having to read from my script, but **I'm old**, I can feel it in my bones, see it in my children's eyes, I can hear in my voice - yes **I'm old**. 11 years ago I never thought I'd get to say those words, as Rabbi Mandell might attest to.

But I'm not sad. Age sometimes comes with wisdom and understanding! Now, I view life as mimicking a rainbow, yes a rainbow! Bear with me for a few minutes as I attempt to explain my analogy with a brief fantasy tale I have conjured. I think it also ties in nicely with this Day of Atonement.

In my tale, we start our life's Rainbow Journey on the day we exit from our mother's womb. We then travel slowly on this beautiful arc on either a short or a long trail or anywhere in between, slowly ascending to its zenith, around middle age perhaps. From there, we turn east and begin our decent to its nadir in Jerusalem, arriving on the day of our expiration, <u>predetermined</u> by God.

So where does a promised "free will" enter the picture? Good question! Well like any real rainbow, ours exhibits the spectrum of light from red to blue, but in my tale these colors represent the manifold variety of paths of life we choose to travel on. Voila, there's our promised free will! Not surprisingly the path's end does not yield a pot of gold but rather something far more precious, a transit pass to a place we Jews refer to as Sheol.

Sheol, I picture to be a celestial Grand Central Station; in essence a meeting point where the newly departed soul-entities mill about waiting for God's arrival, - to pass final judgement. All life records are meticulously kept there. New arrivals are pouring in on a daily basis. There is much scurrying about, - confusion, chaos and anxiety is rampant. Where do we go from here some cry out? But soon these fears are allayed by the sound of celestial music, wafting over the throngs, eerily played by a harpist, - of course. Then a mysterious, but firm voice, perhaps angelic, calls out for their attention. "The first group to receive Divine judgment will immediately assemble at Gate #3. You have been the Hitlers and Putins of the world and you show up here with little if any soul left, what *chutzpah*!" "Fie on you! Get on the elevator, no dallying" the voice continues, "and descend down, down, down to the final stop – Gehenna," - which incidentally is the Jewish version of Hell - "and there you will rot for eternity." A harsh judgement indeed, but well-deserved.

The next crop of souls to be dealt with are those souls that failed to reach life's end in their required, fully-charged, enhanced state. (Here, I'm referencing the remarks I made on Rosh Hashanah that some of you might remember.) God knows who you are and informs them that their departure will be through Gate #2. They are told to board the bus to **Resurrection** Central, another Jewish belief, where they will be re-educated on the need for soul enhancement, given a new persona, followed by a return to earth to have another go at it. And lastly, those with fully recharged and enhanced souls are to be lovingly escorted to Gate #1. Who knows, among them might be a soul belonging to a deceased CBI minyanaire who had fortunately taken heed of our earthly pleas. They now receive their robes and are awarded entry to the long-sought eternal **Afterlife** we often refer to as **Heaven** – there to be greeted by predeceased love ones and be free to play pickle ball, Bingo or Canasta or whatever, until the end of time!" Often, Hashem will return them to earth as "angels on assignment!" Maybe you have encountered one!? You ask about sex – sorry I have no idea! You'll have to wait and see!

That about sums it up -- and now we should turn our attention back to our Mahzorim and pray that the color, or the so called "path of life" we have chosen includes **our** names, inscribed and sealed in the Book of Life for <u>yet</u> another year on this imperfect but beautiful planet of ours. *Aliveye*!

#### 2024 Yom Kippur Message Caren Jacobson Enriching Social Interactions at CBI

I am here to share my thoughts on the CBI Pillar, "Enriching our Social Interactions."

I translate this to mean: Creating and developing strong relationships with one another and developing community at CBI.

I think this begs at least 2 questions.:

How do we create these relationships and community?

How do we know when we achieved it?

First question How do we create these relationships and community?

The first step and most important step, though it may seem simple minded, is BEING together. The trick is then to figure out what draws us together. Why would we want to be with each other. In those moments I felt the strength of our community. I know it's kind of sappy but it's true.

Eating together, what could be better. When we eat together, we talk together, we laugh together, we learn about each other and we develop relationships with each other, which means we want to share with each other.

Opening our homes to one another.... Something happens when we are welcomed into each other's homes. We begin to know more about each other and that brings us closer.

Reading books together and sharing our thoughts on matters large and small. Helps us understand each other and learn what makes each of us tick.

And then there's Fun together. As Robin Rose likes to say, "How about just some Fun to get us together" like watching a football game together, taking walks together, watching plays and movies with Jewish themes together and of course eating afterwards too. Or a games night, Chanukah party or listening to music together. We are even planning a bowling night. Now that's pretty retro, think 1950s. Remember people who bowled together stayed together.

Here at CBI, we do have a program committee with spinoff committees, which is no way exclusive, always looking for new folks to participate and reenergize with new or old thoughts. The goal is trying to capture the pulse of CBI and what draws us together.

Second question: How do we know when we have achieved our strong relationships and community?

I believe one way we know our relationships and our community is strong is when we are there for each other in both joyous times and grievous times.

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#### 2024 Yom Kippur Message Caren Jacobson Enriching Social Interactions at CBI

In this past year since Oct 7<sup>th</sup>,2023 I know I have been grappling, we have all been grappling, with the enormity of the tragedy in Israel since the Hamas attack. I know we have all shared with one another our sadness, our worries, concerns, our feelings of guilt for sleeping in our comfortable beds at night, our endless need to hear, read, see the news, witnessing from afar so much death, destruction and hardship, hearing our Israeli cousins say they have no hope for the future in Israel and yet they probably won't leave it, seeing factions in Israel struggling to try to live and survive in an uncertain future. During these times we have come together in groups facilitated by Bob and Hilary to help us try and process some of our thoughts and feelings. Robin Insuik came down from Maine, the Silversteins came from the Cape. The Rabbi's family including a son and siblings came long distances as did some of his friends. Colleagues from Merrimack College came as well as Co-Board members from the Lazarus house in Lawrence. It was truly special and the CBI community came out strong to support Rabbi Mandell.

So now you ask the question. How is this pillar doing? Is it holding our roof up? Is it keeping our souls in check? letting them intertwine and support one another?

By my estimation I would say yup.... very strong. Could it be stronger? Of course... But then again that's what makes life worth living....




