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Lach L'cha!

"If a tree falls in a forest, and there is no one to hear the tree falling, does it make a sound?"

Being philosophical in nature, this question has more than one answer. If one defines "sound" from a scientific perspective as "vibrating air," then the falling tree clearly makes a sound, whether anyone is there to hear the noise or not.

If one defines "sound" as the result of a conscious experience, however, then there was no sound or noise made. In other words, no matter how loud the "thud" may have been, when the tree fell to the ground, if no one was present to hear the sound, was there really any sound?

In the same way, does the Torah really exist in the world, unless we Jews are willing to study and to seek to fulfill the teachings and commandments set forth in the Torah.

In the Book of Deuteronomy, for example, an intriguing paradox appears. The Torah initially mandates that "[T]here shall be no needy among you," and even goes on to explain, how a society such as ours can make this happen: "by opening your hand and lending [your brother] sufficient for whatever he may need."

Yet just a verse or two after setting out this expectation and how to fulfill it, the Torah states, almost apologetically, "[T]here shall always be needy ones among you."

If we are commanded by God to eliminate poverty in our society, then why does the Torah immediately provide that there will always be poor among us? One answer given by our Tradition for why there will always be poor among us is that not everyone will step forward to take the commandment seriously. As the footnotes in our *Etz Chayyim Humash* point out, for example, caring and providing for the poor and the needy is not a matter that should be left to the generosity of some but must be an obligation shared by all and actually woven into the fabric of the society.\

its voice goes out from one end of the earth to the other, yet its voice is not heard." The Torah clearly proscribes the cutting down of a fruit tree, so that the plaintiff cry of the fruit tree's not being heard is a metaphor for the tree cutter's having failed to comply with the clear teaching of the Torah.

MESSAGE OF THE MONTH FROM THE EXECUTIVE BOARD

Just Imagine—Do we have any Imagineers out there?

United Synagogue (USCJ) is rolling out a new program for a select 12 synagogues across the country to participate in what is called "The Sulam for Imagineers." We are not one of those 12 congregations. However, I believe that we can really leverage the concepts of this program, and I am excited to kick off an affinity group to do this...if others out there want to take the path with me.

What is imagineering? The term "Imagineering" was actually first introduced in the 1940s by Alcoa to describe its blending of imagination and engineering, and used by Union Carbide in an in-house magazine in 1957, with an article by Richard F. Sailer called "BRAINSTORMING IS IMAGination engINEERING". Disney filed for a trademark for the term in 1989, claiming first use of the term in 1962. Simply put by Walt Disney, "imagineering is the blending of creative imagination with technical know-how."

Imagineering, the research and development arm of The Walt Disney Company, is responsible for the creation, design, and construction of Disney theme parks and attractions worldwide. Imagineering is comprised of "Imagineers", who are illustrators, architects, engineers, lighting designers, show writers, and graphic designers.

The USCJ Sulam will be led by author Ben Vorspan who recently wrote the book "The Nonprofit Imagineers", where he rolls out how this concept of "Imagineering" to help synagogues today. Jeff Tye has asked the board to watch a 45-minute video where Ben lays out his program and we will be discussing it at future board meetings.

The goal of the imagineering process is to maintain the congregation's history, fundamentals and essence of who they are, yet innovate to remain relevant in tomorrow's world.

For this to work, at the end of the day, the congregation needs to be willing to try new things, to experiment and to not be content to keep things as they always have been. Is our congregation ready for that?

To try this approach, we would want to assemble a "Dream Team". That doesn't mean they are the best people, like the US Men's Olympic Basketball team, but rather they are willing to "Dream." A Blue Sky dream is often defined as starting with a blank sheet of paper, no limitations (i.e. finances or technology) and discussing the possibilities. In general, our world is often made up of dreamers, realists and spoilers and for this type of project to work, you bring in the realists and the spoilers at the end of the process.

The first step is for the dreamers to do their thing. A safe place, where no ideas are bad and where one idea spawns 10 others. Eventually you end up with a laundry list of possibilities that we all know 95% won't see the light of day. But the more ideas you have, the greater number the 5% will end up being. The realists and the spoilers will then take the laundry list and funnel the ideas down to what can become a reality.

The key is to offer change in a responsible way, in small increments with beta testing completed over several months, and where we assess feedback, make adjustments, and then decide if we want to make the change(s) permanent or not.

In one hypothetical problem raised in the video, Ben starts with the premise that he does not like the salad dressing that is offered at the Kiddush Luncheon. The stream of consciousness from the dreamers went like this:

Is it the dressing or really the salad that people don't like?

Are there other healthier sides that could be served or perhaps we don't need a salad at all?

If we stopped serving salad, how much money would that save each week?

What could we do with those savings?

Perhaps we could use those savings to offer pre-packaged cookies to offer people a sweet to take home with them after Kiddush to give to someone else which would get the word out about the great kiddushes we have which might attract more people.

If food is an incentive, maybe we should offer danish and coffee in the morning to encourage people to get to services on time.

Or perhaps offer a gift certificate to the 10^{th} person (or 7^{th} in our case) that makes the minyan.

The above suggestions are things that a congregation, including ours, could do that could make a difference and not impact the essence of who they are.


The possibilities are endless and only limited by our own creativity.

In another example, Ben started off by saying "I am hearing from a lot of people that 3 hours is a long time to sit." Of course, synagogue members' thoughts jump right to the length of the Saturday morning service, but alas, he was talking about a major league baseball game. As many of you know, major league baseball put a slew of new rules in place this past year to reduce the length of the games which were averaging over 3 hours, and MLB saw attendance and connection dropping with their fan base. They assembled a team and went through a similar series of dream sessions and came up with 5-10 action items they could do to make the game shorter and more engaging, without fundamentally changing the essence of the great game. Those new rules went into effect last year and the average length of a game went down to 2 hours and 20 minutes.

I would love to start a group to meet every other week to begin reimagining what our shul could be in the next 2-10 years. What are our biggest challenges? How can they be addressed starting with a blank sheet of paper and then eventually addressed given the constraints we really have, or believe we have.


