

Lach L'cha!

As the *sefer torah*(*s*) are returned to the holy ark each Shabbat morning, we chant the following verse in Hebrew: *d'rah'che'hah darchai-noam*, *v'chol n'tee'vo'tee'hah shalom*, "Her [Torah's] ways are ways of pleasantness, and all her paths are peace."

This verse, which is taken verbatim from Proverbs 3:17, serves as the source for one of the most important of the 613 *mitzvot* or commandments established by the rabbis of the Talmud, that being, *darchei shalom*, "the ways of peace". More specifically, the rabbis of the Talmud believed that *halacha*, or "Jewish law," was given primarily to increase pleasantness and peace in the world.

For example, it is taught in the Jerusalem Talmud Gittin 5:9, "In a town where Gentiles and Jews live together, one appoints overseers of charity from Gentiles and Jews; one provides for the Gentile and Jewish poor, visits Gentile and Jewish mourners. We do this for the sake of peace."

I thought of the mitzvah of *darchei shalom* this Chanukah, when the first evening of Chanukah and Christmas fell on the same day, December 25, which, in turn, reminded me of the famous teaching from the Talmud involving two rabbis, who are by now hopefully old friends to many of us, Hillel and Shammai. A non-Jew first approaches Shammai, and then Hillel, asking both of them the same exact question: "[I]f you can tell me everything that I need to know, while standing on one foot, I will convert to Judaism." Shammai, who tended to apply the "letter of the law" in interpreting Jewish law, is angered by the man's question and thus chases him way, chastising the man for asking such a ridiculous question.

Hillel, however, who typically was guided by what he perceived to be the "spirit of the law," takes a more inclusive approach, telling the man that he will be glad to convert him, that all the man needs to know is "not to do unto others what he would not want them to do unto him, and that the rest is merely commentary." Hillel concludes his remarks to the man by strongly encouraging him to now go out and practice this teaching.

With the spike in Antisemitism in our state and country and across the world, it would be understandable, if we Jews decided to pull back and retrench from the greater community. Yet, I am constantly heartened by the non-Jewish clergy in our community, who are greatly dismayed by the increase in Antisemitism, and who have offered to do whatever they can to educate and sensitize their religious communities.

I am thus hoping that we, as a synagogue community, will do even more to reach out during 2025 to our non-Jewish neighbors and showing them the beauty of Torah and of the Jewish Tradition.

Lach L'cha!

This past Friday evening, I had the pleasure and the privilege of leading a Friday night service at our sister synagogue in Andover, Temple Emanuel. In my d'var Torah, I shared that the holiday of Chanukah is about 2 conflicts going on in Israel in the Second Century B.C.E.—the one that most of us are familiar with--the Maccabees' revolt against King Antiochus and the Greeks—but there was also a second, serious and even violent conflict going on in Israel at the same time.

This conflict was an internal one, between the Maccabees and their followers, who are described by the rabbis as "zealots," and those Jews living in Israel, who were more assimilated, having adopted aspects and practices of the Greek culture.

Internal conflicts within Judaism have existed, unfortunately, for the past 2,000 years, starting in the First Century C.E. with the Saducees, the more wealthy and powerful Jews of the time, and the Pharisees, the younger, less powerful rabbinical class. These conflicts have continued up to the present time, with the establishment of different movements in Judaism. I have thus reached out to Rabbi Wilfond, the Rabbi at Temple Emanuel, and expressed my hope that our two houses of worship can do more things together during the coming year, for however important our respective movements may be, *klal Yisrael*, the Yiddish phrase meaning "the whole Jewish community" and the well-being of the entire Jewish community should be of paramount concern for each of us.

I am hopeful that by strengthening our bonds with both our fellow Jews and with the many non-Jews of good faith in our community, we can do our part to fight Antisemitism and to demonstrate that the ways of Torah are to bring peace and pleasantness to the world.

Wishing your loved ones and you a healthy, meaningful, and blessing filled secular new year!

"IMAGINEERING - PART 2"

As we approach the end of Chanukkah (ending in the evening of Jan. 2, 2025), we also know that we have begun a new secular year. (Dick Clark probably didn't even realize that new generations would enjoy welcoming in the New Year with as much celebration and fanfare as he created back then, or did he??) Many around the world will be trying to create several resolutions to enact over the coming year. History tells us though that most of these resolutions will typically fall by the wayside by the end of January. Instead of saying something big like, "I will lose 30 pounds in the next 3 months", what if it were changed to "I intend to lose 10 pounds per month for the next three months by eating a healthier menu". This breaks the goal down to a much more manageable intention and it has a specific plan (or component) to get there, making it more likely to succeed.

If you haven't read Jon's article yet (or even if you have), it's well worth the read (or re-read). (It can be found on our website bethisraelmv.org in the December'24 Bulletin. The focus of it revolves around the Disney concept of imagineering and how it can apply to non-profits such as ours. To learn more about this process, I purchased the book that Ben wrote on this topic. Not surprisingly, it's a very interesting, enlightening, and enjoyable read. Just like a "New Year's" resolution can be restated / reframed to make it more achievable, so too can CBI's next chapter in our continuing journey be furthered with the right guidance. 




